President's Message

t has been a fabulous year for village collecting. Department 56 has introduced amazing designs, our Associate Members have hosted outstanding artist signing events, the NCC put on an incredible in-person Gathering followed up afterward with a fun and informative Virtual Mini Gathering. We have seen growth! Several clubs have reported adding new members. And the BIGGEST part of the year—the Grand Opening of the Department 56 Gallery!

In August, while attending the Gathering, collectors were surprised by the announcement of the creation of the Enesco Gift Shop and Department 56 Gallery at Elvis' Graceland in Memphis, TN. This announcement had collectors excited and guessing what this amazing place would be like... but we had to wait another 3 months before the grand opening of it. The Gallery comprises several different rooms taking up over 75% of the building it resides in. They are set up in each of their respective villages, vignettes, separate special displays and museum style cases.

Why Graceland you ask? Department 56/Enesco's new owner Joel Weinshanker is Managing Partner of Elvis Presley Enterprises. Elvis loved Christmas, he loved to decorate and would have loved what Department 56 villages mean to collectors and the holidays. Joel's vision was to share the history and spectacle that is

Department 56. Nothing has ever been done publicly on this scale before.

NCC board members were invited for a special preview of the Gallery before the public Grand Opening. I had the opportunity to be the third person outside of employees to enter the gallery. I was both speechless (something that many know doesn't have often) and talking a mile a minute about what I was seeing.

Before venturing into the World of Department 56 the board had the pleasure of meeting Jack Soden from Elvis Presley Charitable Foundation.

The Elvis Presley Charitable Foundation (EPCF) was formed by Graceland/Elvis Presley Enterprises, Inc. in 1984 to continue Elvis' own tradition of generosity and community service and to honor his memory. The EPCF is overseen by the management team of Graceland/Elvis Presley Enterprises, Inc. The Elvis Presley Charitable Foundation is a separate, purely philanthropic 501(c)3 charitable organization. The staff operate the foundation in addition to their regular responsibilities and the company underwrites all the EPCF's administrative expenses. Therefore, all the EPCF's funds are used for charitable donations, with nothing deducted for staffing or any other costs of operating the foundation.

The EPCF created the Elvis Presley Endowed Scholarship Fund at the College of Communication & Fine Arts at the University of Memphis to assist students majoring in areas that relate to Elvis' own career: music, film, television, theater, etc. The EPCF also has a long-standing relationship with one of Elvis' favorite charities, Goodwill Homes, a Memphis facility that provides counseling and services for abused children and their families. The EPCF has also quietly assisted numerous other charities through the years, especially focusing on arts, education and children's programs.

EPCF was the chosen charity with the proceeds raised from the Christmas at Graceland Sample Piece and the VIP Trip to the Grand Opening at the auction at our Village Luncheon in DC. The NCC board members in attendance presented the check for \$12,000. The oversized check was then donated to the Elvis Presley Archives.

Collectors are greeted in the foyer of the Gallery by the original 6 Snow Village buildings each on their own encased pedestals. They are flanking the Sparkling Gold Department 56 Dot Logo. The first



room you encounter is referred to as the Timeline Room. As visitors progress through the room you see highlights from the last 47 years of the company. Historical documents, Showroom Awards, various village pieces including an extremely rare Dickens' Village *Mill* sample that belonged to village designer Neilan Lund. Lund brought the idea of Dickens' Village and using porcelain as a medium for villages to Department 56. What makes this piece even more special is that it was signed by Neilan himself.

Department 56 made sure to celebrate 1992 on the timeline. Part of the NCC exclusive pieces are in the gallery, representing that year. This is just the beginning of the NCC display; there will be more added to it in the future including a display of various club, Gathering and NCC pins.

This part of the gallery will continue to grow as the years pass by.

You quickly pass into the next room on your way to the Snow Village main display. This room has a beautiful wall mural of the original six with shelves on both sides housing the early years of Snow Village. In addition to the Snow Village, there is another area that shows the process from concept to paper mock-up to the wax mold to the final product.

The next area that also catches your eye as you enter the Gallery is the Snow Village Pyramid. This 20' x20' x20' structure houses most of the ceramic village arranged in yearly fashion. This design has many aspects to it. It allows for expansion, it gives an overview of the collection and it also shares the same design as the Memphis Pyramid. This structure used to be a music venue now houses a Bass Pro Shop. Throughout the peripherals of the room are other displays showcasing different Snow Village subsets, licensed pieces from the past and the original 2000s Snow Village *Elvis' Graceland*.



The next stop is Dickens' Village. The massive centerpiece houses a majority of the collection with the early limited editions on the very top. It shares the space with a corner dedicated to Charles Dickens' *A Christmas Carol*, a staple in the collection for most of its creation. The desk sitting in the Christmas Carol Corner was used at Department 56's former headquarters One Village Place. And was also used in a past issue of former Department 56 publication *The Quarterly*.

The third room is a shared space between the Christmas in the City and North Pole. The City showcases some of the most beloved structures since the beginning, including all of the city skyscrapers (most with silhouettes of the building behind them). The North Pole is next with two different full scale displays. But before you get there it's time for a potty break. Between the restrooms is a hilarious banner of the North Pole Up North Outhouse. After enjoying the twinkle bright forest in the North Pole display you enter the final area of the Gallery.



This last area is filled with several villages. A selection of both New England and Alpine are nestled in one corner. Those are then followed by groupings of licensed villages: Peanuts, Nightmare before Christmas, Mickey's Christmas Village, Mickey's Pumpkin Town and the following displays had hidden surprises for those attending the Grand Opening; both the Grinch village and Harry Potter showed off yet unreleased 2024 pieces in their displays!

The last display in the final room is fenced off to keep the ghouls and goblins in—Snow Village Halloween. The display holds many highlights from all 25 years of Halloween. It had the best of the creepy, the number ones of the spooky and pieces that are special to Halloween's own story as a village.

After taking in all of this, you enter the gift shop with its exclusive pieces.

The Grand Opening officially happened after the Christmas lights were turned on at Graceland. The Gallery was flooded with hundreds of visitors, village collectors and Elvis enthusiasts alike. Media outlets were there for this momentous occasion. The Gallery means a lot to village collectors, to Graceland and to the City of Memphis. They interviewed Enesco President Michael Griffin for the perspective of what it means to the company, followed by an interview with myself and NCC Vice President, Anna McPherson and NCC Secretary, Jeffery Kirchner to understand what it means for the collectors. For the next two and a half hours guests flowed through the doors. The NCC board assisted the Department 56, Enesco and Elvis Presley Enterprise (EPE) team. We were met by so many people amazed at the displays, wanting to know more about the history of the company and collectors wanting to connect with others that love villages.

The weekend was just beginning.

The next two days were filled with time at the gallery. Friday and Saturday village artists Scott Enter and Tom Bates along with Ms. Lit Town Melinda Seegers greeted collectors, signed pieces and enjoyed sharing stories about collecting and designing the *Christmas at Graceland* piece and the *Lisa Marie Plane*. It is always a great time hearing the artists perspectives on pieces they create especially when it is a real life building.

Even though the Gallery creation was put into motion by Joel, it would not have been possible or even happened without a dedicated crew that included members from EPE, Kiri Namtvedt who designed the Harry Potter from Department 56 headquarters, Stephen Pepin, of Showcase Displays— the King of Styrofoam carving, and the Lady of the Gallery, the queen of fresh fallen snow, our favorite village sales rep Lisa Johnson, who took on this project making it her baby. She spent days, weeks, months making sure that this amazing place was ready for collectors; she made sure each display was perfect; and she opened hundreds (if not thousands of village boxes) that included finishing one display just moments before the NCC Board's early tour. We can not thank her enough. She made sure villagers have home! Thank you, Thank you, Thank you!

I encourage you all to make the trip to visit the Gallery and all that Graceland has to offer.

Dear NCC collectors and friends:

Let me start by wishing each and everyone a very happy holiday season! Hopefully, by now, you are putting the final touches on each of your village displays. Now take some time to sit back and enjoy the fruits of your labor – what do you like about this year's display that you didn't do last year? Did you take pictures? Photos can be very helpful when trying to build next year's display. (Don't trust your memory!) I think that it's kind of fun to make some changes every year, it keeps things fresh and your visitors will love looking for those changes in your display.

We were pleased to be included in the grand opening of the Enesco Gallery and Gift Shop in Memphis, TN on November 16, 2023. The Gallery includes the largest collection of Department 56 lighted pieces and accessories that have been designed and manufactured over the years. When the company was started in 1976 we began a collection, holding back one of every piece that was designed. These pieces were put into an archive and stored in a warehouse. Over time, a few pieces have either broken or were lost. This past summer we went through the hundreds of cartons choosing the most popular pieces to display at the Gallery. As you enter the Gallery you are greeted by the original six ceramic pieces that comprised the first offering back in 1976. It seems appropriate that we honor these, they are the roots of our company. Each of these special six pieces is displayed on a pedestal with an acrylic protective cube covering each piece. To the right, you can enjoy a newly produced video that shows how these pieces were designed and manufactured. Also in this room are examples of some of our early giftware pieces, special Dickens' Village pieces and examples of some of our more memorable giftware. It is a pictorial history of our company.



A huge pyramid of Snow Village pieces (arranged chronologically) gives the collectors a good look at how the pieces have changed in the last 48 years. Our factories have learned to add more details, use other mixed media attachments, decals, lighted window fronts, sound, animation, etc. to create some of the best pieces for collectors to add to their collections. From there you will see the Dickens' Village display, and some special vignettes that call out some of your favorite Dickens' pieces in the last 39 years. We have the Alpine Village, New England Village, Christmas in the City, North Pole, the Grinch Village, Mickey's Merry Christmas Village, Peanuts, Harry Potter and Downton Abbey.

For the opening weekend, we were delighted to have two of our Village artists on hand to sign the pieces that were designed exclusively for the Gallery. Scott Enter signed *Christmas at Graceland* and Tom Bates signed the *Lisa Marie Plane*. Right now both of these pieces are only available at Graceland.

Christmas Traditions from Around the World

Christmas Pickle

The Christmas pickle is a German-American Christmas tradition. A decoration in the shape of a pickle is hidden on a Christmas tree, with the finder receiving either a reward or good fortune for the next year. There are a number of different origin stories attributed to the



tradition, including one originating in Germany. This theory has since been discounted, and it is now thought to be a German-American tradition created in the late 19th century. In fact, the New York Times reported that out of 2,057 Germans polled, YouGov determined 91% were unaware of the legend.

Giving Poinsettias in Mexico

Poinsettias, which bloom in winter, are indigenous to central America, specifically to southern Mexico around Taxco del Alarcon and the state of Oaxaca. A Mexican legend tells of a girl who had nothing but a bunch of weeds to offer the baby Jesus at a Christmas Eve service. When she knelt to place the weeds by the nativity, the bouquet burst into bright red flowers. Ever since then the flowers, whose leaves are said to be shaped like the star of Bethlehem, have been known as the Flores de Noche Buena, or Flowers of the Holy Night, and become synonymous with Christmas.

Decorating Fir Trees in Europe

Pagan Europeans would bring a fir tree into the home during the winter solstice. Tree worship was common, and they would also decorate a living tree outdoors with candles and ornaments symbolizing the sun, moon and stars on the tree of life. In Scandinavia, people decorated their homes and barns with greenery for New Year to ward off evil. Since evergreens symbolize eternal life, greenery helped Europeans visualize the spring to come. It's not known exactly when Christians began to use fir trees as Christmas trees, but the cities of Tallinn in Estonia and Riga in Latvia lay claim to the first documented use of a public tree at Christmas and New Year celebrations.

Sweden's Yule Goat

The Yule Goat has been a Swedish Christmas symbol dating back to ancient pagan festivals. However, in 1966, the tradition got a whole new life after someone came up with the idea to make a giant straw goat, now referred to as the Gävle Goat. According to the



official website, the goat is more than 42 feet high, 23 feet wide, and weighs 3.6 tons. Each year, the massive goat is constructed in the same spot. Fans can even watch a livestream from the first Sunday of Advent until after the New Year when it's taken down.

Japan

Although Christmas isn't a national holiday in Japan (an estimated one percent of the population is Christian, according to Smithsonian Magazine), its citizens still find an interesting and delicious way to celebrate. Rather than gathering around the table for a turkey dinner, families head out to their local Kentucky Fried Chicken. The tradition began in 1974 after a wildly successful marketing campaign called "Kurisumasu ni wa kentakkii!" or "Kentucky for Christmas!" The fast food chain has maintained its yuletide popularity, causing some people to order their boxes months in advance or stand in two-hourlong lines to get their "finger lickin' good" food.


